Youth host screenings, lead discussions about their work, and use their media to educate, inspire, and galvanize communities around challenges AND solutions in classrooms, community meetings, and at conferences and film festivals around the world. **Lifelong Learning and Critical Literacy.** Youth decode the media landscape and respond with powerful messages of their own.
